#### Did You Know...

- Most drivers speeding on your street live in your neighborhood.
- Speeding in neighborhoods is a primary concern of citizens throughout the U.S.
- 41,059 people daughters, sons, brothers, sisters, mothers, fathers, friends - died on America's roadways in 2007. That's an average of 112 deaths per day each and every day of the year. (NHTSA, 2008)
- The death rate per miles driven on residential streets is over twice the death rate on highways. (NHTSA)
- More than 1,000 people die every month as a result of speeding-related crashes. (NHTSA 2004)
- A pedestrian hit in a 30 mph zone is three times more likely to die than one hit in a 25 mph zone. (General Estimates Database on Police Reported Accidents - 1999)
- Speeding Triples the Odds of Crashing. (AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety - 2006)
- 200 deaths and over 17,000 injuries occur each year as a result of running stop signs. (Safe Kids Worldwide - 2003)
- 4.200 lives could be saved each year if 90% of the U.S. population wore seat belts. (NHTSA)
- After applying KEEP KIDS ALIVE DRIVE25 decals to all trash cans, an Oro Valley, Arizona neighborhood of 1000 homes reduced average speed from 29 mph to less than 25 mph (a 13.4% decrease).
- The first completed pre/post study citing effectiveness of Keep Kids Alive Drive 25 yard signs in Oceanside, CA demonstrated a 16% decrease (6 mph) in average speed.
